In Search of

Below is an email from Jay Guillory, fox 2/5 '69. He is trying to put a memory together and a name to a fellow Marine KIA in Oct/Nov '69. Here is his email:

Chris,

There was a Marine killed around the last of Oct69 or the beginning of Nov69. I do not remember his name. I did see him die. I knew all of the marines killed during this time frame that are listed on the website. I didn't know if you had a way of locating a kia by unit. Maybe someone else remembers him. I do not mean to be so graphic but maybe this could jog someone's memory.

Following is what I remember about him: He was white. We referred to him as the old man(about 26 years old). He wore glasses. Killed by a booby trap (one piece of shrapnel through his glasses into his eye). Served with 3rd platoon. Platoon commander at the time was a Lt. Ferris. I know very few marines listed on the site that were with 3rd platoon at the time.

Dan Bullock's Historical Roadmarker.....from Dave Brown

About four years ago, I took on a project that I believed had merit. I was challenged in an email by a retired USAF senior master sergeant from Wilmington, NC, who somehow found out that Fox's PFC Dan Bullock was the youngest American serviceman killed in Vietnam. His death happened on the lines at An Hoa on June 7, 1969. Bullock, a mature-looking Marine, was 15 at the time on his death.

I agreed to get one of those grey road signs that gives a bit of history, you know, "300 yards from this point lies the remains of" I thought, "Shouldn't be that hard and a sign like that would be good for us Vietnam vets and good for Fox. Truly a 'win-win' situation". I thought, "Hey, this is going to be a piece of cake!" I called the North Carolina Highway Historical Marker organization in Raleigh and some very accommodating person told me that their records showed earlier inquiries into this task. What they needed was supportive documents dealing with birth and military records, etc.

I became busy the next year, getting a couple of steel parts put in my hip and knee, starting a second book, and taking on my current and a most-compelling job as the head of the Second Marine Division Association. As the months rolled by, the Bullock road marker project slipped further and further down the priority list.

Regretfully, I must now relinquish the task of getting something done for PFC Dan Bullock. I do believe that this is a worthy undertaking and should be plausible. I also believe that the state historical road marker organization will support the project. Feel free to contact me if anyone desires to take the lead on this desirable project.

Silent Night, Black Hearts raid insurgent camp

Quietly motoring across the ocean surface under the cover of darkness, 18 Combat Rubber Raiding Crafts (CRRC) carried Marines to a beach to enter a mock insurgent camp and disrupt activity in the area.

More than 120 Marines with Company F (Co. F), Battalion Landing Team 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines (BLT 2/5), 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU), conducted a boat raid as part of MEU Exercise 2009. "That information drove our planning and execution."

The Black Heart Company, a nickname Co. F earned during the Vietnam War, arrived at Beach Landing Site Silver, and secured it for follow on forces. The Black Hearts then made their way inland, flanking the insurgent camp by advancing from north to south with the ocean cutting off any hope of escape. Company F had been preparing and training with the complex tactics of a boat raid for months before arriving on Okinawa.

According to Vudt, this training paid off during MEUEX '09. "We train for boat raids so we can have a clandestine element of surprise and provide the MEU commander with another option for insertion," said the Allentown, Pa. na-

"This mission was important because it gave the Marines of the MEU raid force a realistic situation to encounter," said 1st Lt. Jeremy D. Adams, the officer in charge of the mock insurgent camp and Powell, Wyo. native. "The only thing that makes Marines proficient is to provide realistic training scenarios that allow Marines to gain the experience necessary to execute a mission," he said.

tive. "MEUEX validated our previous training and allowed us to prove our ability to successfully execute a complicated amphibious raid."

Company F is now validated and ready to serve as the BLT's boat company and support the MEU during its Fall Patrol of the Asia Pacific Region. The MEU is considered a

To enhance the raid's realism, some Marines role-played as insurgents armed with blank ammunition and executing a day-to-day activities schedule within the insurgent camp. "Insurgent leaders held weapons classes and gave propaganda lectures as a part of that schedule," said Adams. However, the MEU reconnaissance elements kept the enemy under close surveillance, reporting back to the raid force everything they saw over the course of these two days.

"The reconnaissance assets provided valuable information on the enemy," said Capt. Rich V. Vudt, Co. F commander. force in readiness in the Asia Pacific Region and needs to be able to respond to a variety of contingencies with appropriate action.

Some additional information offered by Gunny Fergusen indicates that the "Black Heart" moniker came in the 80's from a new company commander when he started calling them Black Hearts and it stuck.



From Chris......Senior Pass to National Parks and others

Here are the links to the several agencies where you can purchase a Senior Pass which gives you access to all National Parks for free. This pass costs \$10 and it lasts for a life time. You have to be 62 and apply in person at a national park because they have to verify your information. With the Cody reunion coming up and many of us will be visiting Yellowstone and some of the other parks it might be just the right time to get their pass.

Here is the site which tells you about the Senior Pass. This Pass replaced the Golden Age Passport that used to be issued by the Army Corps of Engineers. Passes can only be obtained at one of the above agencies in person.

What does the Senior Pass cover?

The Senior Pass admits pass owner/s and passengers in a non-commercial vehicle at per-vehicle fee areas and pass owner + 3 adults, not to exceed 4 adults, where per-person fees are charged. (Children under 16 are always admitted free.) Note: Photo identification will be requested to verify pass ownership.

Example Yellowstone fees.

The entrance fee is \$25 for a private, noncommercial vehicle; \$20 for each snowmobile or motorcycle; or \$12 for each visitor 16 and older entering by foot, bike, ski, etc. This fee provides the visitor with a 7-day entrance permit for both Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks. Remember to keep your admission receipt in order to re-enter the parks. Snowmobile operators must possess a valid motor vehicle operator's license.

TRESCOTT, CHARLES R. (KIA) Citation: The President of the United States takes pride in presenting the Silver Star Medal (Posthumously) to Charles R. Trescott (5980445), Hospital Corpsman Third Class, U.S. Navy, for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action while serving as a Corpsman with Company G, Second Battalion, Fifth Marines, FIRST Marine Division, in the Republic of Vietnam, on 3 May 1966.
