And also a heartfelt **THANK YOU** with lots of love to my very talented cousin Kathy McLendon (at left) for making and donating the beautiful quilt! Of the \$1,850 collected for the Association, probably \$1,500 was attributable to the quilt alone. It was a lot of work and the love that went into making the quilt showed beautifully in the finished product.

The Association business meeting was held on Saturday morning with a good turnout. Rick Mack gave a status on paid

members which is only about 90 guys. At the 2004 reunion the dues were raised from \$10 a year to \$20. Since the dues were raised, paying membership has fallen and we don't know if that's a direct result of the dues increase or other reasons. There was also a lot of discussion about what the members get for paying their dues. The answer of course is the newsletter. (There were a few comments from the group that were complimentary of the newsletter which I greatly appreciated.) The dues collected and money made on the raffles held at the last two reunions go totally to the operation of the Association to pay for the printing and mailing of the newsletter, some monies for the biannual reunions and other miscellaneous operating expenses as none of the officers are paid for their work in running the organization. Also, the costs of maintaining the website are paid for totally by Tom Hohmann, our webmaster.

There was a discussion about possibly sending out an official G 2/5 tee-shirt or ball cap as a gift for joining the Association. It was also discussed that if we were to send a tee shirt or ball cap (or something else), the cost of either item plus packaging and shipping would essentially eat up the amount paid in dues with only a couple of dollars ending up in the treasury. Nothing was decided at that time but when we have a better idea on costs for any official G2/5 item, we'll advise everyone in a forthcoming newsletter.

Barney opened up the floor for nominations for Association Officers for the next two years. A motion was made from the floor to reinstate the current Association officers. The motion was seconded and endorsed by the members unanimously.

The current status of the website was also discussed at the meeting. The suggestion was brought up to look into the possibility of creating our own G 2/5 website. A couple of our Association Officers who have experience with creating, maintaining and updating websites, Tony C. and Rick Mack, took the action to work on this project. If we have any other website experts out there who have the time and ability to help out with the maintenance of the website, please contact Barney Barnes ASAP.

Besides, I didn't even know them. Well, after pages of E-mails, some calls (and broken promises on my part) I finally decided to go to "Reunion Myrtle Beach 2006". I was hoping to maybe get some closure on the war (I remembered it as a fun little war) and possibly get some of my memories back.

MY FIRST REUNION by Robert Shinkle

My name is Robert "Bob" Shinkle, some of you call me German, and on the 20th of Sept. 2006 I attended my first Golf 2/5 Reunion. I didn't know what to expect when I showed up. Some of you were glad to see me and some were kind of "oh well I don't remember him". I was scared shitless about being there because I thought it would open old wounds that I tried for 38 years to keep hidden. From the first day there I heard about firefights that I don't remember and people that got hit that I didn't remember, or maybe I had just forgotten. There were a few there that I genuinely remembered and was glad to see. At no time while I was there did I ever bring up the subject of actual combat, I asked about what happened to a few of the guys that I did remember and was told what happened to them. I listened and kind of kept my mouth shut because I was still scared. Most of you were probably the same way at your first reunion and quickly got over it, unfortunately I'm not that way. I have become the type of person that shows up, stands around and doesn't get involved or keeps his mouth and stories to himself. Some of you talked to me like it was only yesterday that was the last time you saw me, right Grossy? Some didn't say two words to me the whole time I was there; of course I didn't help matters either by not coming up to you and introducing myself. I wish I had the head and memory to remember all of you guys but, I don't. My wife and I had a great time while we were there and she can't wait until the next reunion, me I'm still kind of reluctant. Why? Because I'm still scared. I wish to hell I knew why, but I don't. That's not to say that I won't be at the next one, I probably will, but I'll still be scared. As to whether it will open up those old wounds and make the nightmares start all over again I don't know, only time will tell on that count.

I think the reason I don't remember most of you is because when I got to Nam in Dec. of '67 I was told by some of the old timers, don't make friends and I didn't. Except for two that I can remember, my team leader Paul and our machine gunner "Pappy". Well one isn't here anymore and the other one I was told would be a vegetable the rest of his life. I guess Paul isn't a vegetable after all, but I didn't know that and never tried to find out. In my entire 21 years in the Marine Corps I can hold up one hand and tell you how many friends I had. I could never get used to the idea that one minute they were there and the next minute they weren't, whether they were killed, wounded, or just got transferred. I stood there at that reunion and watched some of you guys hugging and crying with each other and genuinely meant it. I have never been able to get into that kind of stuff and maybe that's why I was scared and still will be. My daughter has been working with me to try and come around to that way of action. One thing I have learned is how to say I love you, now that is something I can honestly say without hesitation, "I LOVE YOU GUYS". One person I really have to thank is "Doc Higgins", if it wasn't for him I don't think I would have gone to the reunion, he kept after me until I said yes I will come just to see his ugly butt. Then I started seeing and meeting you guys again for the first time in a long time. I don't think I have ever been prouder to have served with a bunch of guys as I did with you of Golf Co., 2ndBn. 5th Marines. I hope at the next reunion I can be more talkative and be able to hug and mean it. Until then,

Hello my fellow Golf 2/5ers;

My name is John Boiros and I live in Taunton Ma. I was with Golf 2/5, 2nd platoon, in Vietnam from Sept. 1969, until Feb. 22, 1970, when I was medivaced out of the bush. Not a full tour, but that seems to be a pretty common thing with all that was going on at that time. I still count myself as being lucky though, considering we all know people who made the ultimate sacrifice.

I would like to talk to you about our assoc.'s reunions. My first one was in 1987, in Washington D.C. It was a memorable reunion, especially with the blizzard. It made for some good stories and great pictures, with the white snow and the black wall. It gave everything a mystical and eerie look. That reunion was huge, we had the whole 2/5 Battalion, it was in D.C., it was Veterans Day, and of course the Wall. It was overwhelming to me, and I staved away for 19 years.

The strange thing of it all, is that I stayed a member of the Golf 2/5 Assoc. the whole 19 years, always looking forward to the newsletter, reading about the reunions you were having, what was going on with the guys, good news and bad. It actually felt like I was getting to know some of the guys, without having actually met them.

In reality I was just a voyeur, watching from a distance. It was like I was on a one man OP (observation post), hiding in the bush, watching, but never giving myself away. Then in 2001 I bottomed out with my PTSD, and that's a good thing. Now I know who my enemy is, and I'm fighting it. I have great backup in this battle with PTSD, most of all from my wife Maureen,

my family, friends, and the VA (when they have the money). My point is, my mind was in a different place in 1987, than it is now, and that is why I think I wanted to go to this most recent reunion. Maybe I'll even have an article on PTSD in the future.

This brings me to the present, which is the reunion we just had in Myrtle Beach, S.C, I was a little apprehensive about going. Would I meet fellow Marines that I knew in Vietnam? Would I be accepted by Marines from different eras in Vietnam? I think there were about 50 Marines at the reunion, none that I knew from Vietnam. Talking with them, we learned that some of us over lapped with our time in country. But being in different platoons in Golf Co., our paths hardly crossed, since most of our work at that time was in a squad size unit. But I didn't need to worry. Those 50 Marines were not strangers, they were only friends I hadn't met yet. And that's the truth.

From the get go, it was like a large family reunion and everyone was welcomed with open arms. Rank in the military didn't matter, that was then and this is now. We have all been made equal and brought together by our like experiences.

Sometimes I think,"Gee, I should have gone to some of those other reunions". But this was the right time for me to be hooking up with my fellow Golf 2/5ers.

I'm not going to reiterate everything that went on at this reunion, I'm sure that will be covered in other articles. I just want to reach out to other vets who are on the fringe, who are wondering if they should go to the next reunion. My advice is "Go for it", nothing ventured nothing gained.

Like a lot of you, I went years, decades really, without talking about the war, Vietnam, being wounded. Nothing. I just pretended none of it ever happened. Holding it in only helped the problems to fester and to grow. In the long run the only one fooled was me! But being with my fellow Marines from Golf 2/5 gave my pride back in my military service and pride back in myself. So take a chance.


