Here it is almost November, and I'm still cutting my grass! Was that not the best time in DC or what? Thanks to MIKE ERVIN for all his hard work in putting it together. And a big heart felt THANKS to Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, our own General Pete Pace and wife, Lynne, for hosting all of us at his home for "HAPPY HOUR". Thank you Sir, that

was the highlight of the Reunion for us, your graciousness not only broke the ice for those who had never met you, but also guaranteed that the reunion got off on the right foot. If you missed it, you missed a Great Time. By all accounts, it was in terms of Marines showing up, our most attended function to date; we had almost 50 Marines attend. Thanks men! I hope each and every one of you had a great time. I have asked, like I always do, for the new Marines who attended to say a few words about experiencing their first reunion for this newsletter. Let me just say a big "THANKS" to all the first time attendees, this is what it's all about, reaching out to our Marines who have vet to make one of our events.

In the last newsletter, I mentioned that I wanted to include the letters that I have received from one of our brothers. Ruben Garza, who has fallen on hard times and is currently incarcerated at the Federal Correctional Institution in Texarkana, Texas. Ruben has given me permission to include his letters to me and I have chosen to provide excerpts from said letters, because of space limitations. Bottom line for us, Ruben is indeed one of US and we need to keep him in our thoughts and prayers. Ruben was a member of 1st Platoon from June, 1966 – July, 1967.

"My brother and Marine Barney,

Thank you for your most well received letter and warm welcome into the G 2/5 Association. And thank you for reaching out to me; I feel a sense of belonging. Do you know how good it feels to actually receive a letter or something through the mail? It is a blessing.

I have been in prison for five plus years of a 27 year sentence for Drug Conspiracy. There is no parole in the Federal System for drug offenders at this time. Can I still be a member even if I am in prison? I am very sorry for what I did to end up in prison. I take no pride in it. I feel very shameful. I would rather be in Iraq fighting along side those Marines than to be here in prison. I really mean that.

I lost my wife of 30 years, she divorced me. I don't hold a grudge nor am I bitter. I am a Christian and being close to God has been my mainstay. I have a son and a daughter and I thank God for them both, my son Ruben is my only contact with the outside world. I also have four beautiful granddaughters that I have yet to see or hold in my arms.

I don't want you to feel sorry for me. In no way is this a sob story either. I am not a career offender; this is my first time in prison. I made a terrible mistake. Prison life is extremely hard. I will be 58 on Nov.19. I suffer from PTSD and am also on the Agent Orange list. I thank God for taking care of me. I pray on my knees daily and trust Jesus Christ to watch over me. I try to stay active in prison., I jog, lift weights, run up and down stairs, to maintain my stamina and conditioning – a Marine never gives up.

Thank you fellow Marine Barnes for taking your precious time to read this letter. Please write back. May the Lord richly bless you and your family.

Golf 2/5 Reunion, Washington, D.C., Sept. 24 – 26th, 2004 by Larry Ortiz

As Barney reported, the bi-annual G 2/5 reunion was a major success with probably the largest turnout of any reunion. We had a large number of first-timers from the '66 – '67 timeframe. It was great to meet the guys many of us have corresponded with via e-mail for quite awhile and be able to put a face with the name.

The planning of this reunion has been underway for almost two years since our last reunion in Branson, MO in 2002. A lot of effort goes into planning and making all the arrangements for a reunion and as Barney has also said, all who attended are grateful to Mike Ervin for taking care of all the hotel arrangements and the conference room for our Association meeting on Sat. the 25th. (Mike has written a more detailed account as the Reunion chairman that appears later in the newsletter).

A few days before heading to D.C. for the reunion, the emails were flying fast and furious (thanks to our Information Director, Tony Cartlidge for keeping everyone well informed). The word was being spread that a very extraordinary function had been arranged with Gen. Peter. Pace (the Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff). We learned that Lt. Pace (as he prefers to be called by the Nam vets he served with) and his wife, Lynne, were hosting a reception for all the G 2/5'ers in attendance at the reunion at his residence at Ft. Myers, VA overlooking the Potomac and Washington. When I first read the e-mail, I was dumbfounded and not certain I was really reading what I was reading. I mean, here's one of the most important people in the United States military taking the time out from his busy schedule (what an understatement that is) to host a reception for a bunch of old Nam grunts. What was even more incredulous is that's just what he (Gen. Pace) did!

We met in the lobby of the hotel around 1800 to try and determine how many vehicles there were and if there were enough to ferry everyone over to Ft. Myers. Well, in classic Marine style, it turned into one major "cluster f - - -." What for a few minutes seemed well organized turned into chaos and cars were leaving with some empty seats and without clear directions. A group of us also took the Metro to a station near Ft. Myers to be picked up after other loads of people had been dropped off. For a while we thought we had been forgotten and were going to have to pick up a taxi from the Metro stop but Mike and a couple of other drivers picked us up and we got there "fashionably late."

The reception was set up in the backyard of Lt. Pace's home with a lavish and beautifully presented variety of delicious finger foods, veggies, fruits and desserts. There was also an open bar to satisfy the thirstiest Marine! It turned out to be a very pleasant balmy Sept. evening—just perfect for a backyard party.

She and Stu have been such an integral part of the G 2/5 Association since it's inception that it would have not been the same had she not been there. In addition to the Marines and their wives who attended, it was an extra special evening for me because my wife Melba and I were going to meet the family of a good friend and fellow Marine who was in my gun team in Nam, Clyde Carter, who was KIA the first day of the battle of Hue City. We met via the internet, thanks to our G 2/5 website, about five years ago and have spoken by telephone about the circumstances of Clyde's death and many times over the ensuing years. Shortly before G 2/5 went into Hue City, Clyde had been reassigned to 2nd platoon and was in Mike Copeland's gun team that first day in Hue. Both Clyde's sisters, Carol Shi and Pat Brown as well as Pat's husband, Jerry, took the opportunity to join us at the reunion to meet many of the Marines who knew and had served with their brother. It was a real pleasure and honor to meet my friend's family. (Pat & Jerry share their thoughts on the reunion later in the newsletter)

Despite the lavish spread provided for us, I only managed to nibble on a few things during the entire evening. I was so excited seeing so many of my Nam brothers, meeting Clyde's family and actually being at Gen. Pace's home—it was almost too overwhelming. I guess the best way to describe it was like being in a state of euphoria—it was an incredible feeling. I couldn't attribute that euphoric feeling to too much to drink as I only drank one beer the entire evening. For several weeks after that evening, I would think back to that night and that same euphoria would return. I didn't understand why until I started receiving some of the comments from many of the first-timers. We've received many comments from our first-timers and the common theme through all the comments was how much the reception hosted by Lt. Pace meant to everyone. (All the comments received appear later in the newsletter). However, one of the comments in particular, by Tom Marshall, helped me finally understand why that reception, that evening, was so incredible for me. Tom wrote, "I will always consider Gen. Pace's reception as a "welcome home gathering" for each of us." Tom nailed it for me-it was the welcome home that we all deserved but never received—until the evening of Sept. 24th, 2004! I will be eternally grateful to Lt. Pace, his wife and his staff for treating us with such kindness and respect. It wasn't only an evening of hanging with your Nam brothers, and Gen. Pace, it was an evening of healing for all of us who were lucky enough to attend.

Lt. Pace's Aide-de-Camp, LCDR Kerry Kuykendall, also graciously sent me two complete sets of the photos taken during the evening as well as two CDs with the digital photos that will be posted on the website. I promised LCDR Kuykendall that I would mail the photos to all who attended as there are still a few grunts that don't have computers and I'm sure all in attendance would want their photos with *our* Lt. Pace.

On the following day, Mike Ervin arranged for a conference room to have our Association meeting and the election of offi-



cers as well as three speakers: Bill Buchanan, author of Full Circle, Paulette Box, a Clinical Nurse Specialist who works in the Post Traumatic Stress Disorder Clinical Team, and Col. John Bates. The good Col. is a more *senior* Marine, shall I say as he was in *the Nam* in the '66 – '67 timeframe as an enlisted grunt and is still in the Corps. Col. Bates talked about the current state of

Bates' presentation, he called several of the Association Officers to the front of the conference room and recognized us for our efforts in keeping the Association going and rewarded us by giving us each an MRE. During the business meeting, there was much discussion relative to the financial state of the Association. A motion was made to increase the yearly dues from \$10 to \$20 and the motion was unanimously passed. So, beginning in January 2005 when dues notices are sent out, you can expect to see an increase.

But, as I was recently corresponding with one Marine who feels that way, in many ways it is difficult to stir up those emotions but, at least for me, the reunions are also very healing and cathartic. I do want to encourage all our brothers, when the timing is right for you, to join us at the next reunion and share in the camaraderie with your fellow Marines.

held our position. We eventually got run out because of subsequent activities.


Golf 2/5 Association had, without a doubt, the best turnout of any reunion to date. As we all know, each of us arrived in Vietnam at different times and, that being the case, we each had our own challenges depending on the weather, TAO, and enemy buildup. And we developed different friendships some of which continued through time.

This reunion brought together time segments of G 2/5. We had Marines who deployed to Vietnam with the Regiment: when it first arrived in Chu Lai; some who made the trip to Dong Ha and the "D"; many to the early days of An Hoa and the Coal Mines; others who remembered the flight to Phu Bai and the eventual march back to An Hoa; and still others of later campaigns.

This was a first! I know when Barney Barnes, the Association President, asked for a show of hands for 1st time attendees, I think half the house went up. And this was interesting to say the least! I say that because one of the difficulties the Association has had is trying to correct a misunderstanding that these reunions were only for the Hue City vets. I think this reunion proved that idea to be erroneous once and for all. I'm not sure of the exact count but, between the Association members, their significant others and together with a couple of guests, we had about 65 people (at least at the dinner).

Business matters went first. Officers were elected: all current officers were reelected. Questions of dues and delinquent members were entertained. The President will address this issue by formal announcement. And subsequent reunion location(s) were brought up. As you can see from the email (vote) taken, Myrtle Beach was the eventual winner for the 2006 Reunion. Once all orders of business were attended, we were held in check with several very informative guest speakers.

The first guest speaker was Bill Buchanan. Bill has written a book titled *Full Circle* and it's based on the chronology of Golf 2/5 as it entered the Vietnam Theater. He spoke a little bit about



the challenges he faced in compiling the work but pressed more towards inviting other people to put their memories to paper. He mentioned that we may all not be writers including him-self but just the fact of writing about the past stimu-

lates growth and sometimes healing. I found it interesting listening to Bill enumerate his life experiences outside the Corps (FBI) especially when he talked about investigating terrorist

activities back in the early 80s.

Paulette Box was the second guest speaker. Ms. Box is a Clinical Nurse Specialist and works in the Traumatic Post Stress Disorder Clinical Team. When I first approached Paulette about speaking she was overwhelmed. She believes outreach forums like this serve a basic good because many people, who may not normally listen, sit up and take notice. She spoke on the general topic

She also spoke eloquently on the connectivity between exposure to constant combat and how it affects each warrior differently. I saw several people in the audience easing forward listening to her soft voice. I will have to apologize for not having a microphone. Most notable speaker was Colonel John Bates (Active). He addressed issues currently affecting Corps activity. Personally, I don't know what was more notable: the fact that he is an O-6 or that he is an active O-6 from our era. As it turns out, the Colonel knows General Pace very well plus I think he has a specialty that's in short supply. Whatever the combination, it's the dedication of men like this that stir the imagination of the young

recruits. We may never read about men like John Bates but meeting him and seeing him in action leads me to believe it would be an honor to follow. Hand Salute, Sir.

The Association did something different this year: we had a raffle. It started off as a fluke with Pat Ervin, the wife of the Association's VP, knitting a replica of the Flag of the United States and suggesting it be raffled off. Larry Hardaway, CPL USMC—When you're serving in the

Once in Nam you quickly realize your inter-dependency on
one another for survival; recognizing you are not in control of
your destiny and fate will determine what will happen in the
coming days and months. You develop a close sense of family
with your fellow Marines; they are all that resembles your

past civilian life. Then for many of us, you're wounded and suddenly removed from these important people, you have an empty feeling of deserting them, of wondering are they all right and what ever happened to them. Thirty-eight years later you walk into a hotel room in Crystal City, Virginia and experience this great emotional high in seeing these fellow Marines. There is great comfort knowing they endured also and they're all right. There can be nothing more gratifying than seeing, shaking hands and embracing these men that daily put their life on the line to help sustain your survival and knowing they are OK and out of danger also. Reunion was this type of an experience. It was closure on a segment of my life that seemed unfinished. It was proof that what I had experienced was also shared by a lot of other people and we are today OK. The reunion was also the beginning of a new segment of my life where we can all enjoy being with each other and know we will never again have to worry about survival in combat.

History: Tom, Ted, Wally, Ed, and Gary made the beach landing when Golf 2-5 arrived at Chu Lai, VN. Gary was in VN in November of 64 when they built DaNang airstrip as security guard with 3-9. Most of these Marines fought in 1966 in Chu Lai and Quang Tri on Operation Prairie.

Larry (Ortiz) has explained in one of the newsletters how Pat first learned of the Golf 2/5 web site from a Marine at work and how we went from there to eventually find Larry. That in itself is amazing to us. We thought we would be lucky to find just one person who knew something about how Clyde died. We never imagined that an entire network of people ex-

isted who were all connected by the events we wanted to understand.

The reunions came up in our first conversation with Larry and he urged us to come every year afterward. We're glad he did, because it has been a wonderful experience. We came expecting to meet a few more people who knew Clyde and maybe learn a little more about that time in Vietnam. But, it was much more than that. We met a warm and generous group of people who welcomed us like lost family members.

There was one particular moment when everything seemed to come together to give meaning to Clyde's death. It was when we were waiting outside General Pace's home to catch a ride back to the hotel. We had just spent two hours getting acquainted with many of you for the first time. During that evening we glimpsed the deep bonds that have kept you together for thirty-six years. We saw the intensity of the feelings, even in General Pace, and understood that Clyde has a special place in a close-knit family of brothers who remember and honor him for what he did on that bridge years ago. I thank you for such a heartwarming experience and I look forward to meeting you again.


